The highlight of each month is the Membership Meeting with specific speakers and exhibits. Each one has been wonderful and February's meeting was no exception. Master Gardner Vaughan Drinkard, Jr., hosted approximately 40 Master Gardeners to experience a littleknown jewel in the heart of Downtown Mobile known as Cornerstone Gardens. Along with the caretaker of the gardens, Dave Paton, both show the immense love they have for this unique piece of history. Vaughan is descended from the original owners of the home, built in 1903, and opened to the public in 2016. Cornerstone Gardens has 80 feet frontage on Government Street and extends 400 feet to the rear. The Gardens boasts one of the largest Mulberry Trees in Mobile. Near the entrance is a beautiful fountain that aptly establishes the serene nature of the Gardens. There are several beehives with over 60,000 bees per hive and over 300 Camellia Cultivars. Carol Dorsey donated a magnificent Staghorn Fern, over 43 years old. The Japanese Garden begins at the Torii Gate which represents a bird in flight and houses many Swifts, birds that decease the number of mosquitos in the gardens. In the Koi pond, realizing a problem with Cranes flying in and eating the fish, a solution was found by placing an alligator head in the pond. They have not seen a Crane since. Between the English Garden and the Japanese Garden, Vaughan's wife hung several hand painted teapots from the trees for birdhouses. Unique. As the tour finishes, you see an artesian well-fed horse bath with a carriage house. Within the beautiful gardens, guests can appreciate not only the serenity of the gardens but the love these protectors of history have and their desire to share it with us. Thank you, Vaughan and Dave, for all you do!

From the Greenhouse Tips, Tricks, or Hacks by Barbara Boone

Editor's Note: This month's new addition to *The Dirt* is Tips, Tricks, or Hacks, a focus on easy and smart ways to save time, add efficiency, and just get the job done!

This issue's tipster is **Bob Howard** (2019), a gardener with at least 20 years of experience, and the recipient of a MBG gift certificate. Bob says he has relocated many azaleas with only one lost in the transplanting process. His tip is as follows:

Use your pinkie finger as a measuring device when determining soil depth when sowing seeds. Depending on your finger length, tip to cuticle is 1/2 inch, tip to first knuckle about 1 inch.

Keep sending your tips for future inclusion.
